(CONTINUED FROM PAGE ONE.) I said to him that I was going to report that he fired at me. He said, you won't have the occasion to report it, for I am going to put a bullet through your brains. As he came up with the revolver I caught hold of it also. Caleb, and the three of us began struggling and the revolver went off and Caleb got shot and I left the revolver in my hand. I took the revolver to the station and reported the matter to Corporal Johnson. I gave the Corporal the revolver in the same condition I got it. All this happened on the Caledonia road in the parish of Manchester.

Mr. Levy said he would call one or two witnesses merely to exhaust the evidence, but he did not see that any case was made out against the accused. As the case stood it was weak on the part of the prosecution and could not be stronger for the defence.
