Rear-Admiral A. T. Mahan Dies in American Hospital.

SERVED IN CIVIL WAR.

Was a Great Writer on Matters Relative to War Vessels.

Washington, D. C., Dec. 2.—Rear Admiral Alfred Thayer Mahan, U. S. N., retired naval expert and writer, died in the Naval Hospital here today. Several weeks ago the Rear Admiral and Mrs. Mahan came to Washington from their home at Quogue, L. I., to pass the winter. Two weeks ago the Rear Admiral suffered an attack of heart disease and was taken to the Naval Hospital.

Camps in Suburbs to Await Arrival of Provisional President.

ANNOUNCED MISSION.

Declares that Foreigners will Receive Ample Protection.

Mexico City, Mexico, via Galveston, Texas, Dec. 1.—General Francisco Villa entered Mexico City at the head of 25,000 troops to-day. He went into camp in the suburbs, where he will await the arrival of General Eulalio Gutierrez, Provisional President. "My only mission here is to restore order in Mexico," this was the beginning of a statement given out by General Villa this afternoon, soon after his arrival.

Villa, reported that communications between Mexico City and Vera Cruz were restored yesterday. General Carranza's determination to "end the present struggle by force of arms" was asserted in a telegram from the first chief, made public to-night by Rafael Zubaran Capmany, head of the local Mexican constitutionalist agency. The telegram declared rumours that General Pablo Gonzales had declared himself Provisional President, and that General Blanco had been imprisoned.

HUERTA GARRISON. Tijuana, Dec. 1.—A demand for the unconditional surrender of the last garrison of Huertista troops in Mexico was sent to the commander of the Mexican town of Tijuana to-day. The demand came from a body of Villista troops which landed in Lower California last night and to-day took up a position opposite the Mexican town of Tijuana. The commander of the garrison was allowed twelve hours in which to decide whether he would surrender or fight.

WAKING THE SLEEPER. New York, Dec. 21.—Concentrating thought waves on the mind of Miss Fanny Gurize, 19 years old, of Elizabeth, N.J., the "sleepy patient" who has been in the City Hospital, Newark for nearly a week, the doctors were able to arouse the girl yesterday from her sleep.

COLLIERS HELD UP. Colon, Dec. 1.—The British colliers Kirkwood and Roddam, which arrived here on Saturday evening to pass through the Canal, were held up by the Canal authorities as they could not produce health certificates from their last sailing port. We understand, however, that a bond has been entered into and the ships allowed to proceed yesterday on their voyage.

WASHINGTON'S STAND. Washington, D.C., Dec. 1.—A warning to a merchant not to circulate false and alarming accounts of conditions in Mexico, was voiced by President Wilson to-day. This, with an optimistic report of the existing situation in the Mexican capital by the State Department, constituted the principal developments given out to-day from the Mexican situation by officers of the Government to-day.

AT WAR COLLEGE. From 1886 to 1889 Captain Mahan was president of the Naval War College, and held the same position from July, 1892, until May, 1893. In 1889 he was appointed president of the commission for selecting a site for a navy yard on the north-west coast. From 1889 to 1892 he was on special duty in the Bureau of Navigation. From 1893 to 1895 he was in command of the Chicago, and in November, 1897, he was directed from active service on his own application. At the time of his retirement he ranked thirteenth in seniority, and was immediately made a rear admiral.

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The State Department issued a statement to-day that the Brazilian Minister in Mexico City, Senhor Dom Carlos Oliveira, has received assurances from Zapata that order would be reestablished there, and that foreign interests would be protected.
