



The Administrator General saw to the starting of a small school for boys in the old vestry room in the St. Ann's Bay Court House. This was called 'Vestry School' and later Drax Free School which moved to Walton Pen in St. Ann. Eventually the school's name was changed to Drax High School. Around 1880 the school moved to the Barbican great House in St. Andrew and was re-named Jamaica High School. It is anyone's guess as to where the Barbican Great House was located. Some say that it was where present-day Sovereign Shopping Centre at Liganea is located. No one seems to know for sure.

The school moved to Hope in 1885. Eventually the plan was for the Jamaica High School to be the feeder school for the University College. The buildings were opened by the then Governor of Jamaica, Sir Henry Norman on July9, 1885. In 1902, a decision was taken to combine Jamaica High School with the university college

> > of the school has changed a lot since it moved to Hope Road. Archdeacon Simms became its Principal in 1885 when the school was still named Jamaica High School. Mr. W.H. Middleton, a Welshman, was headmaster of Jamaica College form 1965 to 1970. He was succeeded by Mr. Ruel Taylor who died December 2014. Mr. Taylor was principal for 23 years and

was succeeded by Mr. Lloyd Bryan. The next principal in line was Mr.

Stuart Reeves who was succeeded by current principal, Mr. Ruel Reid.

There has been fixity of purpose and a continuity of effort, over the last 220 years of the existence of Jamaica College and in attempting to drive away all things dishonourable and unclean and to build the young men up in body, mind and spirit till they come to the full stature of the perfect man, Jesus Christ Our Lord



Tamaica College gave birth to its rich architectural heritage, and in 1989 was recognized as one of the 18 schools to be presented with the Jamaica Heritage in Architecture Award. To be eligible for this award a building would have had been constructed before 1951, and to be architecturally outstanding. Jamaica College has four such structures: The Simms Hall, The Scotland Building, the Old Assembly Hall and the Chapel.

The Simms Hall, named after Rev. W. Simms, a former headmaster, is the oldest and was constructed in 1885 to house the school on its removal from

Barbican. This building reflects a coming together of the architectural styles which prevailed in Britain at that time, and was built in strict conformity with symmetry born out of the Renaissance movement of the 15th century – with a medieval accent in the form of a tower in the centre of the façade and gables on either side.

The other buildings of the same era, namely the Scotland building, built in 1889, and the Old Assembly Hall, built in 1913, reflect a colonial style, not as eye-catching as the Simms Hall, but also with the wide verandahs which characterize the Simms Hall.

The Chapel, built in 1925, is a modest little place of worship, with traditional cruciform layout. Highlight of the Chapel, a replication of the St. Dunstan's window at Canterbury Cathedral, is tastefully set in the west wall, shedding an atmosphere of peace and reverence.

These buildings, with their common characteristics and theme reflect Jamaica College's rich architectural heritage,

gained the recognition they so much deserved in the form of

the 1989 Jamaica Heritage Architecture Award. The unique architecture of these buildings is just one of the many attributes which separates Jamaica College from other schools in Jamaica, thus contributing to the great institution which Jamaica College is today, and one of which past and present students are justly proud.

Today, Jamaica College has constructed several more buildings to add to its magnificent landscape namely the World Bank building, the Karl Hendrickson Auditorium, the Gore building, the Frank Hall Gymnasium, the Drax Lodge Apartments, and the new school's entrance along with the Holy Ground. The school also recently broke ground for the construction of the Mayer Matalon Dormitory.






#### Daniel Jarrett, President, Students' Council

The technology may have gotten better over the years, but the job still comes down to an extremely committed team of individuals and so let me say congratulations first of all on putting out a first rate publication that we can all be proud of.

The overarching goal of the Jamaica College Old Boys Association has always been to support the School and its students while fostering a spirit of loyalty among Old Boys and this current administration has sought to do just that. Over the past year, the JC Old Boys Asso-

Our contributions to JC have been directly linked to the school's success in many areas, not just football. Our swimmers placed third in the 2015 Mayberry Swim Meet, the Chess team made it to the finals of the PCJ Chess Championships and the Debate team won all competitions entered. Our athletes finished third overall at the 2014 and 2015 Lime/ISSA Boys & Girls Championships, the Robotics Team was outstanding at the USFIRST Robotics Competition in NY and JC won the prize for the Best Idea Pitch Competition held at the University of Technology (UTECH). We are immensely proud of these achievements, but there are still urgent areas that need improvement. Our academic performances continue to trend in an upward direction but we are not there yet. Discipline, turnout and bearing are also on the upswing but again, it only takes one major incident of disorderliness to undo all the gains we've made over the recent years. hiking in the Blue Mountains. According to The Gleaner report in 1967, Army and Police patrols, assisted by the Air Wing of the Jamaica Defence Force, are searching the Blue Mountains for five Jamaica College school boys who left Kingston six days ago to hike to the Peak and have not been seen since. Five Jamaica College boys were also lost in the mountains at Easter in 1939 and were found after nearly two weeks of search by the army, police, scouts and citizens.

The boys who went missing in 1939 were Eric Gray, Donald Soutar, Douglas Hall, Teddy Hastings and John Ennever. The five boys who went missing in 1967 were Roger Bates, Gordon Cooper, Cecil Ward, George Hussey and Geoffrey Haddad, thus connecting the two adventures nearly 40 years apart, forever.


Hartley Neita, one of the island's prominent historians and communications consultants penned a book called The Search which chronicled the misadventure of Soutar and his other four Jamaica College colleagues in April of 1939.

On the last day of his hike in 1939 along with his four other JC lads it was he who spoke the first words to persons who they had encountered. According to his fellow hiker Douglas Hall; 'The man who had called now appeared from behind the trees. Needless to say we were surprised.' "You the five buoy dat lost in de bush? "We are", Soutar shouted and the rest became history.

The last of the five boys who went missing in 1939, William Donald Soutar, passed away after a battle with cancer in Florida on January 24th, 2015. Jamaica College continues to commemorate the lives and adventures of these five through the












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






# Perforacing Arts


