

A SENSE OF CARING FOR OTHERS

The Jaycee movement founded in 1920 is a training ground for young people all over the world helping them to improve their skills and themselves through its seminars, lectures, meetings, community work and interaction with one another thus developing in its members the leadership qualities essential to a successful life.

It was introduced to Jamaica by a small group of young executives which included our beloved and now sadly departed friend Danny Williams.

The organization blossomed and flourished under the guidance of Danny and others in its formative years and Jamaica became a highly respected member of the world body respected by all nations.

Danny was responsible for , or at least deeply involved in, many of the projects, programmes, and successes of the young organization such as the Caribbean Trade Exposition in Kingston, Nuggets for the Needy and the purchase of the Jaycee permanent headquarters on Altamont Crescent, a level of work that caused Danny to be elected Vice President of the Kingston Jaycees (now called JCI Kingston) and later the West Indies Jaycees many of whose members rose to positions of leadership in the Caribbean islands and Guyana and thus became a the forerunner of first Carifta then Caricom.

It would be almost sacrilegious to describe Danny as a "superman". Suffice it to say that one of his Jaycee and insurance colleagues described him to me as a "phenomenon", a fitting appellation indeed! It seemed like Danny could do anything. He could build huge buildings like the Life of Jamaica building on Harbour Street, large companies like the Sagicor Group, but as he did in the Jaycees lift people up and help them, a unique gift that he had in abundance.

One small personal incident will suffice to illustrate the humanity, kindness and love that were part of this great man's persona.

When my sponsor invited me to join the Jaycees in Kingston he said he would meet and introduce me at their next general meeting the following day at the Scouts Headquarters on South Camp Road. I attended on time and waited shyly for him at the back of the hall. My sponsor did not show up leaving me shaken and almost terrified. I saw the meeting start with smartly dressed young men in business suits and speaking the Queen's English. I concluded that I did not belong there and was just about to sneak out when a handsome, fair-skinned young man immaculately dressed with hair well groomed and shine approached me. He asked who I was and why I was there. I had hardly finished my answer when he took me by the hand and conducted me into the midst of the meeting, introduced me to everyone and actually made me feel at home and part of the group. These people would later become my friends and we worked together in many Jaycee activities.

That was Danny Williams always alert to what was taking place around him and always with a sense of caring for others. I got to know Danny well and for anyone reading this tribute to our dear departed friend you can bet he is up there with his Lord and Savour trying to persuade him to start a Jaycee Chapter and who knows perhaps trying to sell him some insurance although for what coverage I cannot imagine!

Such was this wonderful man who deserves our prayer that the good Lord will give his soul beautiful and serene peace and rest for all eternity.

RECOGNITION OF THE PASSING OF R. DANNY WILLIAMS

The Jamaica Association for the Deaf recognises the passing of R. Danny Williams who alongside his wife, Shirley, dedicated much of his time and resources since 1956 to support the achievement of the mission of the JAD.

Mr Williams joined the Adult Services Committee (now our Social Services Division) in 1956, to support the development of community engagement and Deaf inclusion programmes for Deaf adults in the wider population. He was asked to serve as Chair of the Committee from 1960 to 1963. This position offered him membership to the Executive Board, where he supported in this capacity until the death of Chairman Lister Mair in 1963, at which point Mr

Williams was selected to carry the torch as Chairman of the JAD Executive Board.

Under his leadership a number of education and hearing healthcare programmes were enhanced, the organisation's structure was improved, and the ongoing partnership between the JAD and the Ministry of Education to support Deaf education programmes was born.

Mr Williams stepped down as Chairman of the Executive Board in 1972 and maintained his presence as an ordinary member until 1974 when he was appointed President of the Association. Even as he stepped down from this role, his engagement with the JAD was consistent, being present at our special functions, and checking in by phone or email to get updates on our activities and to make suggestions to enhance some of our efforts.

To honour his efforts in supporting the development of Deaf education and by extension the wider Deaf community, the Danny Williams School for the Deaf was opened in 1987 in Hope Estate, Papine, St Andrew. Dr. The Hon. R. Danny Williams was established as the school's Patron and served in this capacity until his passing. His tangible support was felt by staff and students last year when he generously contributed to roof repair of all the buildings on the school premises. He visited the school when the work was completed. It was a joy for students and staff alike to meet the man after whom this landmark institution is named. In synchrony with the legacy of its Patron, the Danny Williams School for the Deaf has become a benchmark for deaf education in the Caribbean and will continue as a beacon of excellence.

He will be missed, but his legacy will never fade. The impact of his efforts to develop and sustain programmes to uplift the Deaf community continues to this day, and his intention to spread the light of philanthropy and national service is noted even now through our partners, volunteer board members, and staff.

As noted in his Chairman's Report reviewing the year ending March 1963, "We look back on the year ended with pride; for the coming year we confidently expect to proceed with even greater success in our work of assisting the Deaf community in Jamaica." This statement resonates with us even now as each year we work assiduously to positively impact the lives of Deaf persons in Jamaica. Our current leadership at the level of the Executive Board and operational management, sit firm in the foundation of passion, accountability and improvement as was set by Mr Williams.
