JC CROWNDED WALKER CUP CHAMPIONS





7 Event winners for JC at the Tyser Mills Classics.

The first track meet for the 2023-2024 track and field season kicked off on Saturday and Jamaica College sent a team of 70 athletes to open their season, and some did so in fine style. To open the day the long-distance runners having just completed their road race season, opened on the track and continued their winning ways. Evans Tetteh was the winner in 16:32.84 his $3^{\rm rd}$ in 17:03.35 Dominic Amponsah was teammates Alex Baker and Tyrone Lawson was 6th and 7th respectively. In the class 4 200m Omecco Henclewood won the overall event in a time of 25.27 seconds. In the class 1 1500m Nellie Ambriton 4:09.80, Kemarrio Bygrave 4:16.28 and Rasheed Pryce 4:16.77 were 2nd 3rd and 4th respectively in that event, while in the class 2 section Dominic Amponsah 4:19.14, Evans Tetteh 4:26.19, Samuel Creary 4:28.27 and Shemar Green 4:28.41 were 1st, 3rd, 4th and 5th respectively in that event. In the class 3 equivalent Cavel Nooks was no match to his competitors. Nooks won the event in 4:39.21 while his teammate Rushawn Francis was 5th in 5:03.99. In the class 2 400m DeAndre Isidore recorded the $3^{\rm rd}$ fastest time of the day 51.59 seconds. In the field JC recorded a sweep in the Men's Open Shot Put, having send four of their class l throwers to throw in the open Male category. It was a 1-2-3 finish with Shaiqunn Dunn leading the way with 17.81m, Josh-ty Brown was 2nd 15.42m and Jaylon Calder 3rd 14.89m. In the discus throw Shaiqunn Dunn who also threw in the Men's Open category was $2^{\rm nd}$ with a throw of 53.86m, while Calder won the class 1 category 48.37m. In the boys Javelin it was a 1-2 finish for JC Jemar Ferguson 51.50m and Jayvoni Neckles 51.49 completed the quinella for JC.

Renson who also represented JC in Volleyball, made a mark in the Walker Final game last Friday having scored the penalty and rackling the goal bars on two separate occasions with one acrobatic shot that grazed the side bar late in the game that left the stadium in awe and having fans discussing in the stands that it would have been the goal of the season if it had scored. - Q1. You traveled from St. Vincent to Jamaica to continue your secondary education and to play football. Why did you make that decision?
- A I think that Jamaica is more developed than St. Vincent and there's also a bigger platform in Jamaica so both my parents and I made the decision for me to come to Jamaica.

Q2. How has it been and would you recommend your fellow Vincentian to make the journey here?

A- Taking this step to come to Jamaica has been a good one especially going to Jamaica college where I've developed so much in both football and my education skills and yes, I would recommend other Vincentians to take the step as-well.

Q3. What does it mean to you to wear the blue and white?

A- representing Jamaica college means a lot to me they've treated my like family, and I was ready to represent all the time whether it's on the pitch or off the pitch



Q4. How would you describe the feeling when you found out that you would be named captain of the winningest schoolboy football in the Caribbean. Becoming the first international player to do so.

A- It was a bit shocking because a lot of people told me before I would make history by becoming the first international base student to captain the football team if I was to be name the captain of the manning cup team, but I've been in Jamaica college for 3 seasons, so I thought I grew a bit of leadership through out the years and it's a big achievement for me.

Q5. How would you describe the experience being captain of JC manning cup team?

A- it was a good experience somewhat good somewhat difficult, but I think I dealt with the pressure that comes with the responsibility and I'm grateful for the opportunity.

Q6. I know it must be disappointing for you that you weren't able to defend the title. How difficult was it to bounce back to regain focus.

A- It was really disappointing especially knowing that you have a quality team that could of went to the finals and defended the title, but I think everything happens for a reason god has his plans it's a young team and I hope that they would learn from this season and put their best foot forward next season. After the team dropped out the mood in the camp was low but I think after a few training session the mood was back up and we didn't want to leave with out a piece silverware.

Q7. If you had a redo of this season, what would you have changed as a captain to ensure the title defense was a success?

A- I'm not a person that live with regrets I don't think I would have changed anything I just thought that we were unlucky this season and hopefully next season the team can fight back for the trophy

Q8. Did you and your team saw the Walker Cup as a must win to bring back a trophy to 189?

A- Yes, we know that the walker cup wasn't the trophy we were hoping to win but we saw it as a reward to the loyal fans for all the support through out the season and that they should still believe in the manning cup team to bring home the trophy for the next upcoming season.

Q9. You also played volleyball for JC and helped the team to its first finals in history last season are you planning on playing this season?

A- As I said I'm willing to fight for Jamaica college whether it's on or off the pitch hopefully once I'm injury free and god provides me with the strength to play, I'll be back for volleyball.

Q10. This is your last season at JC how would you describe your three years and what's next for Renson?

A- I've really learned and developed a-lot over the three years and there was a-lot of good memories met numerous amount of good people and I'm grateful for the Opportunity to represent Jamaica college. Now I'm trying to either become a professional footballer or attend a college which participates in the NCAA Championship in the USA

Q11. Outside of football what does Renson Enjoy?

A- I enjoy playing volleyball, video games and just being around my friends and family

Q12. Which sporting figure would you say you idolize and why?

A- there's a lot of sporting figures I admire because I try to take a little bit of something from each person such as Lionel Messi, Cristiano Ronaldo, Shamar Nicholson, Kyle Edwards etc. but the person I admire the most is probably Handal Roban because he took the same step that I did leaving St. Vincent to come to Jamaica college to participate in track and field and now he's in one of the biggest universities in the United States of America performing at his highest and putting St. Vincent and the Grenadines on the map.
