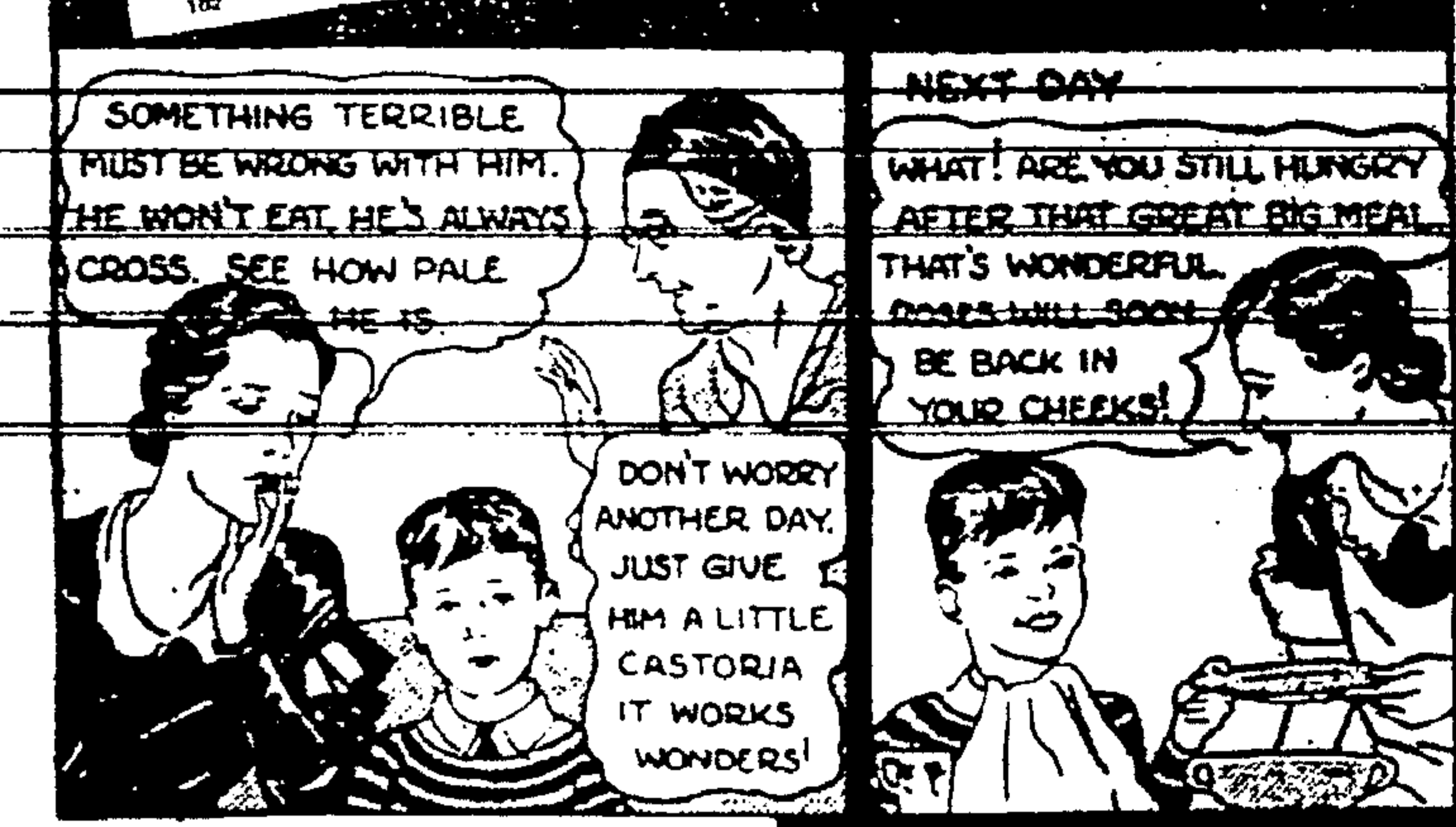

A general discussion arose over the matter of procuring a pulper for the Branch, after which it was decided to get one for the benefit of members from funds of the Society, and that a real campaign be made to educate less fortunate members in the proper curing of their coffee, seeing that the pulper when procured will be at the disposal of all. Mr. Martin, the Agricultural Instructor, congratulated Mr. Peterson for the extraordinary amount of interest he displayed in getting

people interested in the competition and gave a few useful hints concerning the curing of coffee. He then referred to Mr. Ricketts' useful work at Ginger Ridge in connection with the co-operative curing and selling of coffee in that district, and told his hearers of the vast improvement there, so through those methods there was a wonderful difference in price that end to this. He suggested that members should follow the good example set by Ginger Ridge. The assistant secretary then read a letter from the Parent Society acknowledging the receipt of certain statements sent up by the Branch. A suggestion was made concerning a contribution to the Associated Branches for the purpose of procuring a suitable souvenir to Mr. Ricketts, secretary of the Associated Branches from its inception for his meritorious service. It was

however decided to leave over the matter till the next meeting. The Instructor then gave his usual monthly address dealing chiefly with citrus. After the meeting the Instructor went around to several holdings and demonstrated in cleaning, pruning and budding of citrus. **MARLBOROUGH BRANCH.** (From our Correspondent.)

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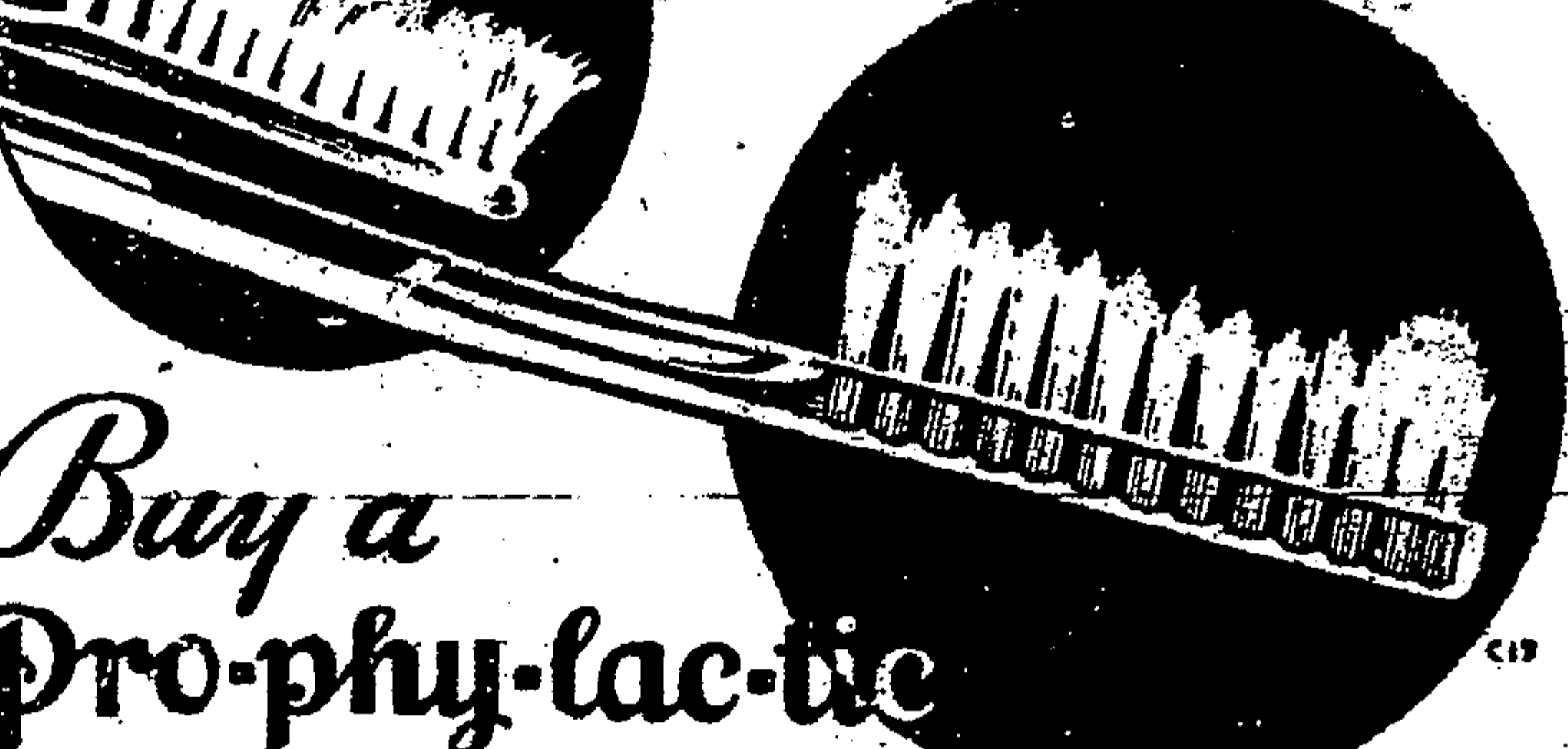
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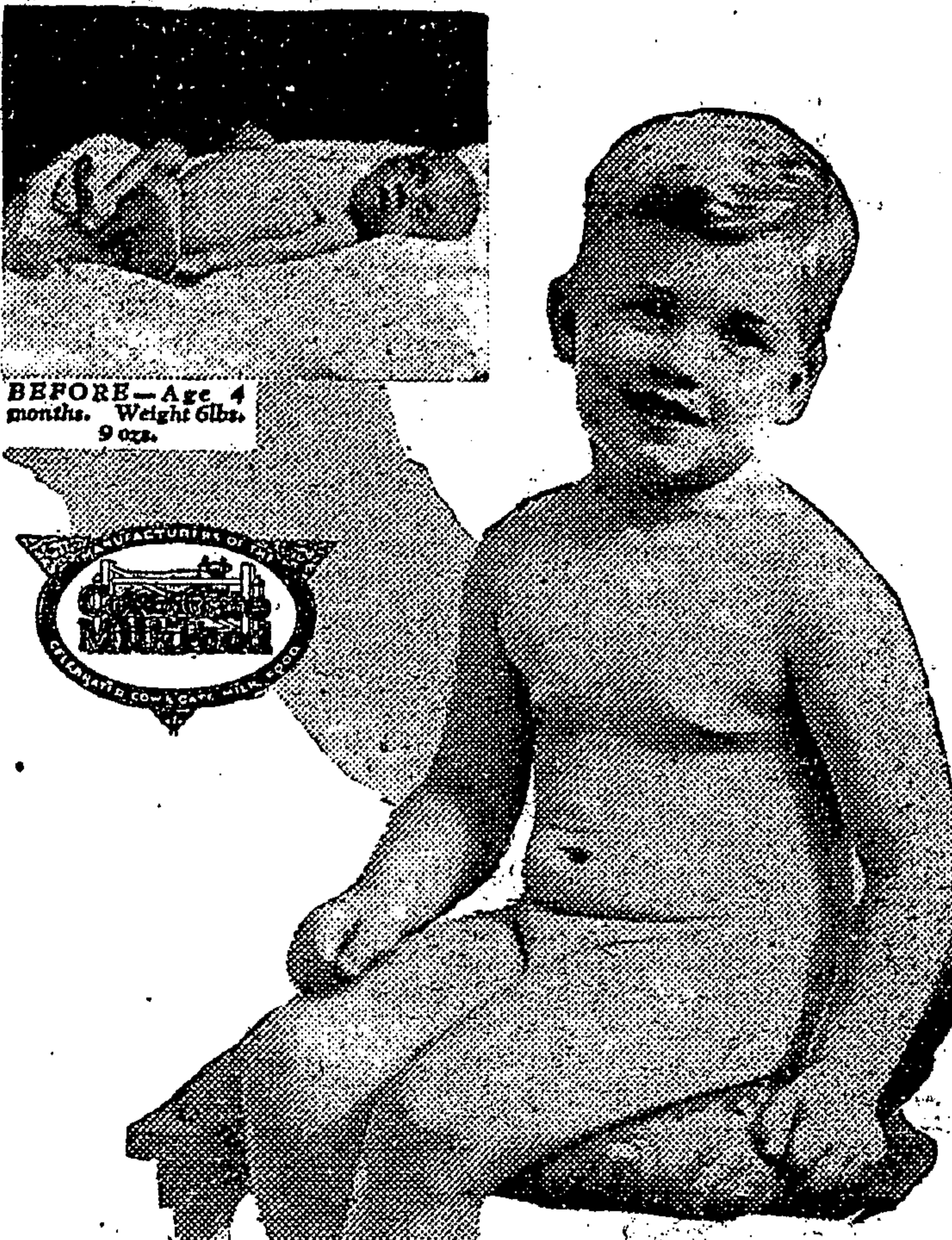
